LETTER FROM THE MODERATOR ... November 21, 2022

Good Morning Friends,

It's a cold one, 13 degrees as Ted, Anne and I stepped out to take our walk. Rice Road is a great place to go. There are woods, farmland and interesting houses to observe. We quickly voted on a temperature that would be a "no go"; that was 10 degrees (later amended to 10 degrees wind chill.)



When Ted and I were delivering Thanksgiving baskets yesterday we got caught in a snow squall that obliterated the road and any vision of the outside world...what a real taste of winter! It was worth it, though, as we were greeted with smiles and heartfelt thanks for the food. These folks were living rough and winter is just beginning. My heart went out to them and I was thankful we could provide a bit of respite for them. When we returned to our nice warm homes and the comforts we expect to find there, I experienced a feeling bordering on guilt. How, I asked myself, does such disparity in our small community happen? What can I do to relieve some of the pain.

Our little church has a program for Neighbors in Need and the Fuel Fund. We are expecting both of these resources to be "taxed to the max" this winter. Yes, I am asking for you to donate what you can to keep these funds available. We also have begun a coat donation program that is starting soon after the Thanksgiving holiday. A coat, a basic need here in Maine, will allow a child to go to school instead of staying home because it is too cold to leave the house. These resources will provide a safety net for our neighbors until state programs kick in later in the season. Giving, that's what I can do, that's what you can do.

At our Council meeting yesterday most of the committee reports were aimed at helping the community. It was almost second nature. No one blinked or said we can't. We can, and we will, help. Many contributions come from folks who are *friends* of the church. They aren't *members*

of our church, but they know we will get things donated directly to those who need it. Thank God for these friends!

This season will be a test for us all. Let us hope our state and our national governing bodies can get past the rhetoric and get the help to our citizens who need it. We can set an example, but our motivation shouldn't be that. We should be and are moved to do this because it is the right thing to do.

I wish you and yours a wonderful Thanksgiving and Christmas season. It will be that much more poignant if you know you have done what you can to help spread the comfort.

- On the second Sunday of October we celebrated Indigenous Peoples' Day. The service focused on honor, respect and support for Native People.
- The third Sunday of October was Laity and Children's Sunday and was led by the deacon's with Pam Williams doing the sermon based on a beautiful children's book she discovered this past summer. Doretta had a well deserved Sunday off.

Program Coordinator, gave a very informative and engaging talk at the Wilkins House, with over 40 people attending. Topics included Native language, myths and symbols, tribal citizenship, land trusts and reservations, the location of different tribes and much more! There were several teachers in the audience enhancing their Wabanaki studies for students. We look forward to learning more through the resources at the University of Maine Native Studies programs, John Bear Mitchell, and his colleagues.

A Resolution in Support of Tribal Sovereignty

Our church conducted a book study on the book, **The Gatherings**, **Reimagining Indigenous-Settlers Relations**, twice this year, via Zoom. The second study was co-sponsored by the Maine Conference of the United Church of Christ's Social Action Committee (SAC), of which I am a member. Out of this committee's discussions and the book study, along with studying current legislative initiatives, the committee created and presented a resolution supporting tribal sovereignty in Maine to the Maine Conference of the United Church of Christ Annual Meeting in October.

Since the 1980 Settlement Act, Native tribes in Maine have not had the same rights as all other tribes in the United States. Because of our part in the education of the SAC, the Waterford Church council was asked to endorse the resolution ahead of the state vote. At the state meeting in October, the resolution was voted in nearly unanimously. This gives UCC churches in Maine the backing of the Maine Conference to take appropriate action, including education, and legislative advocacy in support of the Wabanaki people in Maine. As you can see, a little church like ours played an important part in a significant state level church initiative. More importantly, this resolution lays the foundation for our churches to be allies to the people who have lived and cared for this land for thousands of years. 

Ralph Sylvester Honored on Veteran's Day...



The Raymonds Describe Their Special Hobby...

As many of you know, Denny and I spend quite a bit of time volunteering for various organizations locally, but not all in Waterford. One organization dear to our hearts is Maine Sheltie Rescue (MSR). I run their website...a challenge and always a learning experience! The exciting and more fruitful work we do for them is to foster Sheltie-dogs that are without homes. These Shelties are strays or are owner-surrendered. We have fostered 13 dogs since

2015, two of which were strays with no family history. Since 2009, we have adopted 5 MSR dogs. They often are old souls, so their life time with us tends to be on the short side.

Pictured here are the 3 Shelties we have at this time. They make a lovely pack, each bringing their own sweet personalities to our home.

In front with the big red bow is Miss Kelly Girl (11). Kelly was owner-surrendered and came into rescue two years ago. She was 52 lbs...she now weigh 29 lbs! Kelly was fostered by two other MSR families beside us, and we all fell in love with her. What a happy dog! Sadly, we had to have all her teeth removed (which were rotten) and her sinus passages repaired. She wears the big red bow because she is now a forever-rescue (which means she will never be adopted) and is the MSR Mascot. Denny



absolutely fell in love with her, so she lives with us, MSR pays her food and medical bills, and we have the fun of her presence, but not the expense!

Behind Kelly is Queen Willow Bee (13). We did not foster Willow. The MSR foster family that had Willow loved her, but did not have a spot in their pack for another dog, so they were attempting to find a home for her. Two possible homes were considered, but neither were a match. They were preparing to put Willow on Pet Finder, but I said NO, we would adopt her. She has a lovely sweet nature. Her favorite spot is under the legs as you sit so you can scratch her back. BTW, Willow came into Rescue a little over two years at 10 lbs (She almost died of starvation. Her elderly parent kept forgetting to feed her (Alzheimer's.) Gratefully now she weighs 22 lbs. She has a very young nature, loves her walks and her dinners!


The little dog with the cute crooked ear is Little Manny Boy (5). Manny has been with us just over a year. He was a failed foster (Yes, we fostered him and adopted him.) He came to us from an apartment situation where he could not run and play (no fenced yard). Instead, he was leashed all the time, yanking and pulling and barking at everything he saw. The apartment administration told the family: You go or he goes! And why did we adopt such a handful? Well... he is awfully cute and full of exuberance! AND Kelly loves him. We do not get young dogs often in Rescue. His age appealed to us, and we knew he would need training, which I was pretty sure I could manage. Well, it is a bit of a struggle, but he is learning. By the time he is an old dog, he will be quite well behaved (HA!).

Anyway, this is our at-home family...along with the 3 cats. They keep us happy, entertained, and well exercised as we walk most every day (weather permitting!)
