

MISSION NEWS ...

The Mission Committee met on August 18th to review the rest of summer/fall 2022 and to decide where to focus our mission work for the coming year.

As times continue to feel uncertain, our church's participation in the <u>Church World Service (CWS)</u> <u>Kits</u> ministry is a blessing to so many. While neighbors around the world struggle to provide for their families, our kindness fills their hearts. As communities face natural disasters more frequently, our compassion lifts them as they clean up and begin to rebuild. Starting Sunday the 21st of August we will kick off our CWS <u>Cleanup Bucket Challenge</u>. We are challenging our "Little Church with a Big Heart" to fill <u>at least</u> 10 buckets with cleaning supplies by Sunday the 25th of September. (see more information below) We will display all our buckets on the 25th as we dedicate them and get them ready to deliver to a depot site in Meriden, CT. From there, CWS will forward them to a site world wide that is cleaning up after a natural disaster.

In addition, we will continue to strive to be a "5 for 5" church. (Dodi and John, our church treasurers, have already sent in financial support from our church for 2 of the 5 missions for 2022 - <u>Our Church's Wider Mission</u> (OCWM) and <u>One Great Hour of Sharing.</u>) • The next focus will be <u>Neighbors in Need</u>. Offering envelopes will be available the 1st Sunday in October. The project ends on October 30. These gifts will be used for local, national and global disaster relief.

We agreed to follow our church's CALENDAR OF GIVING and review other needs as they arise.

We believe that each person is unique and valuable. It is the will of God that every person belongs to a family of faith where they have a strong sense of being valued and loved.

CLEANUP BUCKET CHALLENGE... Families may choose to fill a basket on their own. Or...they may combine with another person/family to fill a bucket. Each bucket will contain about \$75. worth of cleaning supplies as listed here:

- One 4-8oz. pump spray air freshener
 Five scouring pads (No stainless steel or pads with soap in them (Remove from packaging)
- Seven sponges, including one large
 One scrub brush (with or without handle)
- 18 reusable lightweight multipurpose dry cleaning towels (No terrycloth, microfiber or paper towels. (Remove from packaging)
- One 32-64oz. or two 25oz. bottle(s) of liquid laundry detergent
 One 16-34oz. bottle if liquid disinfectant dish soap
- · One 12-40oz, bottle of liquid concentrate household cleanser that can be mixed with water (No spray bottles)
- One package of 36-50 clothespins One 50-100ft. clothesline(Cotton or plastic) One pair of work gloves (Cotton with leather palm)
- Five dust masks (N95 particulate respirator dust masks preferred. (No surgical masks)
- Two pairs of heavy-duty, waterproof dishwashing gloves (Latex-free, non-surgical. Durable for multiple-use. (Remove from packaging)
- · 20-28 heavy duty or contractor type 30-45 gallon trash bags on a roll (Remove from packaging)
- One 6-9oz. bottle of non-aerosol insect repellent (Pump-spray bottles must have protective covers. Packs of 10-20 insect repellent wipes are also acceptable.)

All cleaning items must be new and all liquid items must be capped and securely tightened.


If you want to try your hand at it, we would love to have you! There is no one way to do this part of the service. We welcome everyone's ideas of what makes peace, from peace inside oneself to global peace, or anything in between. You can write it yourself, or read a poem or quote from a book. The back of the hymn book has pieces that would work as well. It can even be a spur of the moment thought, just let the minister know. It can be short or longer (but not so long as to be a second sermon).

You can do it yourself or have someone else light the candle for you (we have had couples do it this way). After you are done with your thoughts, you light the candle as the congregation sings a response. Give it a try! It is the nicest "audience" you can imagine and it gives you a chance to think about what peace means to you as you prepare for it.




